Andrew, Brandon Walquist honored for Scouting's top honor

Twin brothers Andrew and Brandon Walquist with Boy Scout Troop 1656, chartered through Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Richmond, both were recently honored in a special Eagle Scout Court of Honor ceremony held at First United Methodist Church in Rosenberg.

Chase Adams was the Master of Ceremonies. The court opened with a welcome and prayer by Al Williams. Russell Harrison led the Presentation and Retirement of Colors.

The Color Guard consisted of Bradley Cox, Clayton Coyle, Robert Garza and Taran Garza. Richard Harrison, their former Scoutmaster, led the Scout Law Candle Lighting Ceremony with the help of Christopher Byrd.

Assistant Scoutmaster Roland Garza followed with "The Trail to Eagle" assisted by Reid Williams. Mrs. Darrin Hammons presented congratulatory letters from numerous dignitaries.

Mrs. Gus Evans then spoke of her memories of Andrew and Brandon over the years, beginning with her being their first grade teacher, helping them along in the Scouting program and now the honor of seeing them achieve Eagle status.

Chris Adams, current Scout-

master, then read "I Am the Eagle" and Curt Johnson, their former Scoutmaster, presented the "Eagle Challenge and Charge."

Andrew and Brandon were then both presented with Eagle Scout Awards and honored their parents with pins. The Ben Carter Jr. Silver Dollar Memorial Coin was presented to them, given to each 1656 Eagle Scout.

They were also presented with a Flag Retirement Grommet for patriotism and good fortune.

After the presentation awards, Andrew and Brandon thanked their parents, Fran and Mark Walquist; Scout leaders and other adults and fellow scouts for helping them achieve this notable honor.

Williams gave the benediction, and the color guard retired the colors. A reception followed the ceremony in the Fellowship Hall.

To attain the rank of Eagle, a Scout earns the ranks of Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life and Eagle.

The first few ranks focus on first aid and life skills as well as service to the community. The later ranks reinforce these skills and add leadership and additional service, with a major Eagle Scout Project to complete at the rank of Life.

Brandon's Eagle Scout Leadership Project supported the Joy Lutheran Church on FM 359 in Richmond. It consisted of coordinating and managing the planting of a unique variety of trees that included of live oak, red bud, Chinese fringe, American elm, Chinese pistache and lace bark elm.

He managed installing an irrigation system for them.

For Andrew's Eagle Scout Leadership Project, he managed enhancing the current landscaping and beautifying an area for the Administration Building at First United Methodist Church in Rosenberg. The management of his project included expanding on the
